261 Early and rare United States currency and examples of currency issued by financial institutions in Delaware and a German mark.  
270 The earliest examples of currency in this collection are pence and shilling notes printed by James Adams and Hall and Sellers from 1776-1777. Included in this collection are \$1 notes issued in 1862 by the Farmington Bank and the Somerset and Worcester Bank, and a 10000 Behntaufend Mark note from Reichsbanknote (1922). A 1862 \$1 bill issued by the United States federal treasury in New York City featuring a portrait of US Treasurer Salmon Chase and a 1919 silver dollar certificate, also issued by the federal government, are contained within.  
Also included in this collection is a scrapbook of Delaware currency photostats (n.d.) and a 1965 letter from collector Terry Bryan to State Archivist Leon deValinger discussing the scrapbook and samples of paper used for printing money. This box includes four folders of photostat currency that should be serviced first for reference.
