261 A majority of the records are Fisher's business accounts and records of estates undergoing probate. He was a Wyoming, Delaware, businessman who was a partner with Jakes and Company, a shipping agent, a fruit and grain broker, and large landowner. In 1920 he was elected State Treasurer and served until his death in 1922.

270 Many of Fisher's business records are judgment or promissory notes and bonds, where he loaned money at interest. There are a number of records from Jakes and Company, mostly accounts, with many of those judgment notes. There are also business licenses for the company (1873-1877) and a commission with Wanamaker and Brown (1871).

There are a number of records relating to the settlement of estates. The names of the deceased include: William Atkins, William S. Barger, Nathaniel B. Buckmaster, Thomas B. Cooper, John W. Cullen, Willard A. Gray, Mary A. Gruett, Darling Johnson, John W. Kirby, William Knotts, Alfred Leverage, Henry Moore, and M. B. Vincent. These records include accounts, wills, and sale lists. Also included is a large broadside listing seventeen properties in Wyoming to be sold by the administrator of John T. Jakes's estate, 1899. There are several folders of financial records from Alfred Leverage, mostly judgment notes, evidently used by Fisher to settle Leverage's estate.

Other records in the collection include those relating to the Enterprise Building and Loan Association of Wyoming, 1873-1876. These documents include a copy of the legislative act creating it, treasurer's bonds, a list of stockholders agreeing to dissolve the corporation, and accounts. Also present are "Rules and Regulations of the Odd Fellows Cemetery, Camden," 1877, 1904, and 1921.
