Extract of a Letter from Genl Washington to Congress, dated Head Quarters, New-Brunswick, Dec^r 15th 1780.

"A Paragraph in the enclosed New York paper confirms that part of the letter of the 17th of October from Europe which you desirably say has been placed before me; which mentions the intention of the British Administration to send further Reinforcements to America. This is a matter which cannot, in my opinion, be too soon communicated to the several States, with a pressing solicitation to take measures that will effectually fire up their Regiments in the course of the winter. From what I can learn some are putting the matter upon the very precarious footing of voluntary enlistments — and others are exhibiting fines, where the men demand are not produced in the several Districts. I am very much mistaken if it, the first mode any considerable number of Men are to be raised at this time of day, and from what I have given in the last, money will in many instances be paid to excuse persons from service. The last hope of the Enemy is built upon our inability to raise a New Army, and they are probably preparing to push us out of our present State — The means of re-establishing ourselves with proper equipped Troops are within our reach, and should they in the spring mislead only the remnants of our veteran Regiments to meet the British, filled with Men whose services are permanent, they must either give up their Object, or they will, in the presence of our Army, we shall be in a Condition to fight."

Delaware Council of Safety.

On Monday, the 11th of September, 1775, the Council of Safety for this Colony met by appointment, at Dover, in the County of Kent, and unanimously chose John McKinley, Esq., President, and James Sykes, Esq., Secretary.

The Council continued to sit for six days, and, amid a great many useful measures for protecting and defending the Country, proceeded to regulate the Militia of the several Counties, consisting of nine Battalions; three of which, in Newcastle County, under the respective commands of Colonels John McKinley, Thomas Cooch, and Richard Caswell, Esquires, were formed into one Brigade, under Brigadier-General John McKinley, Esq.; two in Kent County, under the respective commands of Colonels Caesar Rodney and John Haslet, and the Western Battalion of Sussex County, were formed into a second Brigade, under Brigadier-General Caesar Rodney, Esq.; and the remaining three Battalions, under the respective commands of Colonels John Dagworthy, David Hall, and Jacob Moore, Esquires, were formed into a third Brigade, under Brigadier-General John Dagworthy, Esq. Commissions were made out for all the officers, and the seniority and command of each precisely ascertained. There are about five thousand effective men in this Government assembled and determined to defend their just rights and liberties with their lives and fortunes.
