



Witness William Killen Esquire Chief Justice of our said Court at Dover on the seventh day of May in the year of our lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty three.



In the HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES for the Counties of New-castle, Kent and Suffex, upon Delaware, at New-caftle.

SATURDAY, July 27, 1776, P. M.

HE House taking into Consideration the Resolution of Congress of the 15th of May last for suppressing all Authority derived from the Crown of Great-Britain and for establishing a Government upon the Authority of the People, and the Resolution of this House of the 15th of June last, in confequence of the faid Refolution of Congress, directing all Persons holding Offices Civil or Military to execute the fame in the Name of this Government until a new One should be formed; and also the Declaration of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, absolving from all Allegiance to the Brittish Crown, and dissolving all Political Connection between them and Great-Britain, lately published and adopted by this Government as one of those States, are of Opinion, that fome speedy Measures should be taken to form a regular Mode of Civil Polity, and this House not thinking themselves authorized by their Constituents to execute this important Work.

That it be recommended to the good People of the feveral Counties in this Covernment to chuse a suitable Number of Deputies to meet in Convention, there to ordain and declare the future Form of Government for this State.

Refolved alfo

That it is the Opinion of this House, That the faid Convention confist of the Number of Thirty Persons, that is to say, Ten for the County of Newthe Summer of the County of Kent, and Ten for the County of Suffer; and that the Freemen of faid Counties respectively, do meet on Monday the 19th Day of August next at the usual Places of Election for the County, and then and there proceed to elect the Number of Deputies aforefaid, and then for the Directions of the several Laws of this Government for requesting to the Directions of the several Laws of this Government for reques lating Elections of the Members of Affembly, except as to the Choice of In-fpectors, which shall be made on the Morning of the Day of Election by the Electors, Inhabitants of the respective Hundreds, in each County,

That every Elector shall (if required by one or more of the Judges of the Election) take the following Oath or Affirmation, to wit;

I A. B. will, to the utmost of my Power, support and maintain the Independence of this Government, as declared by the Honorable CONTINENTAL

That it is the Opinion of this House, That the Deputies when chosen as aforesaid, shall meet in Convention in the Town of New-castle on Tuesday the 27th Day of the same Month of August, and immediately proceed to form a Government, on the Authority of the People of this State, in fuch Sort as may be best adapted to their Preservation and Happiness.


