Griffith's Chapel Williamsville Methodist Church

When Methodism first came to this area in the late 18th century, residents worshipped in local homes and journeyed to nearby towns to attend services. On November 20, 1848 William and Sarah Griffith conveyed land at this location to Trustees of the Methodist Episcopal Church to build "thereon a church or place of worship". Construction was completed circa 1850, and the building was named in their honor. The chapel is a well-preserved example of a midnineteenth century, rural Methodist meeting house. The plain interior contains a balcony, recessed apse and original pews. Services were conducted here until the mid-1970s. In 1982 the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church deeded the property to the Williamsville Historical Society. Griffith's Chapel was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1983.

The historical society secured, replaced the roof, plastered and painted inside and out and put a new fence around the cemetery. In 1982 the title of the property was handed over by the United Methodist Conference, and the following year the property was placed on the national register of Historic Places.

During the past twenty five years the historical society has provided Christmas Service in the Church almost every year. The chapel has been the site of "Honor the Brace," a Memorial Day Service complete with Civil War Re-enactors. The Chapel is now available for Weddings and christenings.

Griffith Chapel (circa 1850)

The area of Williamsville has been settled since the 1600's. The old Kings highway from Dover Landing to Cannon's ferry ran through Williamsville. This road was situated here because it was easier at that time to build bridges over the headwaters of the streams than over the wider areas.

There were two grist mills in the area. One was located at Blair's Pond and the other at what we now call Abbott's Pond. With the development of the mill dams, roads were constructed over them making travel between neighbors and towns easier.

There was a road running from Milford through Williamsville, Farmington and Vernon to Marshy Hope Bridge.

As early as 1795 there was a store at the crossroads owned and operated by James Henderson. The Beers Atlas of 1868 shows a store located on the southwest corner of the crossroads.

In 1826 a post office was established in Williamsville. The postmaster was William Heathers. The post office continued until 1861.

Public School #47 was located on the road from Williamsville to Milford across from the present church. It was here that the congregation of the Williamsville Methodist Episcopal Church met before the church was built.

Williamsville was a growing community in 1850 when the church was built. Although Williamsville was largely a farming area, it had businesses, a school, and a post office. With the transportation up and down King's Highway, a link from Philadelphia to Norfolk- supplies were easily attainable. The road to the commercial center of Milford also kept this area supplied with goods and services. The people of Williamsville were aware of the happenings in Philadelphia, Wilmington, Dover, and Milford due to the vital link of roads. It was a time of growth, and a proper time to build a church. The land for the church was given by William D. Griffith and his wife Sarah in 1847. Sarah had inherited the land from her father.

The actual construction of the church took place over a two year period, with the lumber being cut the first winter (when the farmers had more time), and the following winter the church building was erected.

The congregation of this church was Methodist Episcopal set off from the Milford Congregation. In 1851 Griffith's Chapel (Williamsville Methodist Episcopal Church) appears in conference minutes as part of the Williamsville-Vernon Circuit. Services were held in the church until 1884 when the congregation moved to Houston Methodist Church. In 1898 the Houston Methodist Church burned and the congregation met at Griffith's Chapel until 1900 when the new Houston Church was completed.

Records found in Griffith's Chapel show that there was a small congregation that met in the church from 1916 until the mid 1970's.

.When the doors of Griffith Chapel closed as a house of worship in the 1970's the congregation was elderly and unable to maintain the building grounds.

In the 1930's the church received a new coat of paint, a new roof, and a fence around the cemetery.

In 1981 members of the community became alarmed by the church's condition. The Williamsville Historical Society was formed with the preservation of Griffith's Chapel as its focal point

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the boundary line crossed the doorstep of the church which was burned in 1934. The first church was erected in 1834. Thomas Baynard was the builder and the building is still in use on the farm of Thomas E. Cahall.

In 1872, work was started on the second structure. The corner-stone was laid on Nov. 7, 1872. It was dedicated in May, 1873, with Bishop Levi Scott in charge and the Rev. Andrew Manship preaching the sermon. Henry Thawley, for many years Supt. of the Sunday School, was the builder. He also cut and hauled the timbers. On Feb. 18, 1934, just after the morning service had closed, the building was burned to the ground. Work was started immediately to build another church. There was some sentiment that the new building should be located in the village but it was decided to retain the old site. Under the leadership of the Rev. Leon W. Ross, the church was ready for dedication on Dec. 16, 1934, with all of the costs met by cash and subscription. The Rev. E. C. Hallman, Dist. Supt., conducted the dedication and preached at the morning service. The Rev. Roy T. Thawley, grandson of Henry Thawley, assisted at the dedication and preached the afternoon sermon. There is a large cemetery enclosed with an iron fence.

Milford Circuit M. E. Church, colored, was located one and one-half miles west of Prettyman's Corner. The church site was donated on May 19, 1894, by Samuel A. Tharp, at which time the church had been erected. It became defunct and no evidence of the church remains.

Houston Methodist Church (M.E.) was built of frame in 1883-84. It was dedicated in October, 1884. The church site, on Broad St., was donated on May 7, 1886, by David Scott. After major improvements, the church was rededicated on Sun., Nov. 26, 1893, by the Rev. W. L. S. Murray. In January, 1899, both the church and the parsonage were destroyed by fire.

A new church site, on Broad St., was donated on Mar. 6, 1899, by John C. Wharton. The corner-stone of the present brick church was laid on July 4, 1899, by the Rev. G. S. Smith. It was dedicated in October, 1899. The church was incorporated on July 22, 1911.

A new electric organ was dedicated on Sun., Apr. 27, 1947, by the pastor, the Rev. Wm. J. McKee assisted by the Rev. Dr. O. A. Bartley. The Wesley Junior College choir sang under the direction of Mrs. Wm. J. Storey. An organ recital was given by Mrs. Ethel Johnson. Funds for purchasing the organ were raised by Mrs. Estelle Biggs' class with former State Senator Robt. H. Yerkes as leader.

Houston Mission M. E. Church, colored, is located on the western edge of Houston. The church site was donated on Nov. 1, 1923, by Geo. F. Dunning. This church was established, in 1924, when the Williamsville congregation secured the old schoolhouse, moved it to Houston and transferred their activities to this point. More land was purchased on June 26, 1928.

Williamsville Methodist Church (M.E.) was the outgrowth of meetings held in the schoolhouse previous to 1850. Then, W. T. Griffith donated a piece of land upon which a chapel was built and named "Griffith's Chapel," in honor of the donor. A graveyard is located beside the church, the tomb stones dating back to 1862. In 1884, services were discontinued and the mem bership transferred to Houston Church. The church was reopened in 1897. After another closed period it was reopened as a Houston charge. Services were discontinued in 1940. The church was reopened on Sun., Mar. 15, 1942. W Rbl Hammed to Supt A State of Deration of the Market M

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church was dedicated. In 1904 a carload of dynamite exploded in the town and among other damaged buildings was our church and parsonage. The railroad company assumed full responsibility and repaired all damages at a cost of \$2,000.

Greenwood Methodist Protestant Church was organized in the year 1879. Upon land donated by Simeon Pennewell, the church was built and dedicated Aug. 8, 1880. The present church dates back to 1904. It was partially wrecked by the explosion of a car of dynamite two weeks after dedication. The railroad company replaced all damages. The church has been improved in 1913, 1927, and 1931.

Griffeth's Chapel, Methodist Episcopal Church, Milford Hundred, located in the southwestern part of the Hundred, was built in 1850. Prior to the building of the church the congregation worshipped in the school house. This church was near Williamsville and was their church until the Houston Methodist Church was built. The building was not used for several years but it was reopened for worship in 1898. It is still active.

Groom's Memorial Methodist Protestant Church. See Lewes Methodist Protestant Church.

Gumboro Chapel, Methodist Episcopal Church, was originally organized under the name of Bethesda in 1778. This building stood outside of the town a few miles. Old Bethesda ceased to function when they moved the congregation into town in 1875. The Methodist Protestants had built a church in town in 1865, but sold it to the Methodist Episcopal society in 1875. They have had two new buildings since then, namely in 1891 and 1925.

Gumboro Methodist Protestant Church was organized and built in 1865. The society ceased to function prior to 1875. At that time they sold the building to the Methodist Episcopal Church of Gumboro.

Harbeson Methodist Episcopal Church in Broadkiln Hundred and located in the town of that name, was built as an independent Methodist Church by a local preacher, Rev. William H. Conway. It was on his own land, and largely built by his own hands. After running it as an independent Methodist Church for several years, he turned over the property and congregation to the Methodist Episcopal Church in the year of 1882. The society having lapsed, the Methodist Protestant moved the building across the road and used it as a part of a new church. This land was sold by order of the Conference in 1940.

Harbeson Methodist Protestant Church. See Beaver Dam.

Hebron Methodist Protestant Church, Georgetown Hundred on the Georgetown-Bridgeville road. The deed was given Oct. 24th, 1888. The deed specifically states the church was already built. The pastor in charge of the congregation was Rev. F. H. Mullineaux. Rev. J. A. Weigand was their first pastor following the building of the church in 1888.

Hepburn Methodist Episcopal Church in Little Creek Hundred was the name of Kings' Methodist Episcopal Church. A gentleman by the name of Hepburn offered them twenty dollars on the day of dedication, 1885, if they would call the church after him. They did so, but in two years they voted to give it the name of Kings. See Kings for more information.

Hickman Meeting House, Methodist Episcopal Church, Cedar Creek Hundred, was organized prior to 1810, for the church was built that year. In 1855, they changed locations and changed the name to Slaughter Neck Zion Meeting-house. This was when they built the second church. This church burned in 1943 and was replaced by a new one in 1944. Perhaps these organizations were the result of the society of Methodists at Draw Bridge. See Drawbridge and Zion Methodist Church.



Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Griffith's Chapel is a neat, plain, one-story frame building, measuring 24X30 feet in its principal dimensions; it is clapboard-sheathed, and corner-framed. The building faces west on a triangular plot formed by the intersection of county roads 442 and 443. Its surroundings are open lawn to the west and south, and a cemetery, with stones dating to the mid-nineteenth century, on the north and east. At the time the nomination was prepared, the original white paint with green trim was almost completely weathered away. However, repainting the siding was an immediate priority within an ongoing restoration. Other minor changes from the original exterior appearance are asbestos shingling of the roof; replaced double entrance doors; a concrete stoop; and stucco over brick foundation. Otherwise, the church maintains very good integrity of exterior mass, fabric, and detail. Interior integrity is excellent.

Griffith's Chapel is rectangular in plan, except for a small (three by six foot) rectangular apse at the east end. This projecting bay is itself gable roofed, and is lighted by narrow one-over-one sashes in its side walls. The side walls of the main body of the church are each broken by two widely spaced two-over-two sashes. Entrance is through double doors, with a plain frame and a simple, heavy lintel, centered in the west wall. A pair of narrow one-over-one sashes is centered in the gable end over the doorway, providing illumination for the interior gallery. The plain ceiled undersurface of the roof is exposed behind narrow vergeboards in the gable ends, and extended over exposed, lobed rafters on the sides.

The interior is a single open space, with a plain planked floor and a ceiling which opens up to a shallow crawl space under the ridgebeam. A small upper rear gallery is supported by two short flights of stair in the northwest corner. The balustres are plain squared sticks. The windows, tall on the exterior, have unadorned frames; the walls are encircled with plain grooved wainscoting. The woodwork framing the apse-like bay is embellished only by simple beading of the outer edges. The altar rail is supported on turned balustres. The movable pews, like the wainscoting, are thought to date from a turn-of-the-century remodeling. Their simple lines reflect the Arts and Crafts aesthetic, and they are hand-grained in a lighter shade than that used on woodwork. Sections of a stenciled border, which ran along the top of the walls and above the wainscoting, have been uncovered in several places. (This stenciling is barely visible at the extreme right end of the gallery in photograph #5 of the accompanying documentation.) The pattern has been reconstructed from these fragments, and the frieze will be reproduced in the restoration, along with the original interior colors.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Griffith's Chapel is architecturally and historically significant as an extremely evocative and well-preserved example of a small mid-19th century rural Methodist meeting house with a fine, unusual interior gallery. In its immediate locality, it is unexcelled as an icon not only of its functional type but of early community life. In the small, sparsely built crossroads community of Williamsville, only a few other 19th century buildings still stand; they are residences, and do not approach the church either in level of physical integrity or in institutional force. Seen in the larger context of southern Kent and Sussex counties, the church holds its own among surviving county churches, both in integrity and in architectural and historical significance. While the comprehensive survey data for southern Kent County has not yet been systematically evaluated, initial review has uncovered no better examples of mid-19th century churches which are equally well-preserved and equally elaborate at this very unassuming scale. In Sussex County, immediately to the south, a recentlysubmitted nomination for Cool Spring Presbyterian Church emphasized an intact interior gallery as an unusual feature in the surviving early architecture of southern Delaware. Historically, Griffith's Chapel is particularly illustrative seen in connection with nearby Barratt's Chapel (N.R. 1972). This large and ambitious structure, built in brick in the late 18th century, has been called "The Gradle of Methodism" because it housed early meetings leading to the establishment of Methodism as a separate denomination. If Barratt's Chapel represents the cradle stage, then Griffith's Chapel represents the rural adolescence of American Methodism. Its simple, functional but affectionately decorated frame provided the necessary setting for circuit riders and lay preachers to a country congregation. For such congregations such churches succeeded the tent meetings and borrowed rooms of the early period; they preceeded the building boom in Methodist churches that followed the Civil War. On the basis of its architectual interest and integrity and of these illustrative qualities. Griffith's Chapel is nominated to the National Register on the basis of Criteria C and A: it embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, and it is associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history.*

From the time of the visit of John and Charles Wesley to Georgia in 1736-37 to the time of the Revolution, the efforts of Methodist missionaries had met with

^{*} The building, while still nominally owned by the Peninsula Conference of the Methodist Church, has been on inactive status for many years, and efforts are being made to transfer title to the Williamsville Historical Society, the local group which has undertaken its restoration. In any case, it is nominated to the Natinal Register on the basis of its unusual architectural and historical merit, and thus in exception to the formal disqualification of structures owned or used by religious groups.

The 20th century heating and lighting systems which had been introduced into the building have been removed as part of the current restoration. Two modern brick side chimneys were demolished; evidence in the attic crawl space of an earlier central stovepipe (and fire) led to the installation of a cast iron wood stove of Pennsylvania manufacture, dating from within a few years of the 1850 construction date of the church. The building has also been de-electrified. Candlelight is the sole source of illumination for the occasional evening meetings now held there. Nineteenth century holders have been installed for this purpose.

JUSTIFICATION OF BOUNDARIES

The boundaries of the nominated property correspond to those of the triangular parcel on which Griffith's Chapel stands. These boundaries provide appropriate visual access to the building from the two county roads which intersect at the apex of the triangle. They also enclose an historic resource in addition to that represented by the building itself: the 19th century graveyard in which early members of the congregation are buried. The parcel has historic integrity, too, in corresponding to the 19th century gift of W.T. Griffith. These factors made the boundaries of the legal parcel the logical boundaries of the nominated resource.

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


The level of significance checked in item 10 is local. In the opinion of Bureau staff and the State Review Board for Historic Preservation, Griffith's Chapel is an unusually, possibly uniquely, well-preserved example of a small, rural Methodist meeting house in Delaware. It could certainly be profitably considered in the context of 19th century Methodist churches statewide, and might well emerge in that context as possessed of statewide significance. However, the comprehensive comparative data which would make such a consideration possible is not yet available. For the present, at least, the significance of Griffith's Chapel is best understood and demonstrated in the context of Milford Hundred, Southern Kent and Northern Sussex counties.

BETWEEN, THE TRUSTEES OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, INC., a Delaware corporation, party of the first part,

AND

WILLIAMSVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY, a Delaware corporation, party of the second part,

WHEREAS, the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, Inc., are executing this deed to the Williamsville Historical Society, an eleemosynary corporation of the State of Delaware, whose members have restored and are interested in permanently maintaining the church building, its contents, the grounds, and the small cemetery in the rear of the church, known as "Williamsville Methodist Church" and formerly known as Griffith's (Griffeth's) Chapel; and

WHEREAS, the history of this church is set forth briefly in the "<u>Churches</u> <u>Of Delaware</u>" by Frank Zebley (published in 1947) and in the "<u>Garden of Methodism</u>" by Rev. E. D. Hallman; (and other historical data) indicates that this place of worship was first built in the early 1800's (and rebuilt several times), and was affiliated with the Methodist Church and used by Methodists in the Williamsville area under color of title and with all the attributes necessary to constitute adverse possession for approximately 175 years; and

WHEREAS, no deed or other recorded instrument of title has been discovered (over the years by search) in the deed records of Kent County, Delaware, or from the records in the office of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church; and

WHEREAS, this Williamsville Methodist Church was officially declared as abandoned at the June 1982 Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church (see p. 146 of June 2-4 Conference Journal) and the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, Inc., were duly authorized to dispose of the same, as authorized by Subsection 2541, Par. 1, of the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church (1980 ed.); and said Trustees have duly determined that a gift of title to all this real and personal property to the party of the second part is the best disposition of the same so as to preserve and maintain it presently and for the future.

NOW, THEREFORE, the said party of the first part, for and in consideration of the sum of ONE DOLLAR (\$1.00) lawful money of the United States of America, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, hereby grants and conveys unto the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, in fee simple, the following described property:

ALL that certain tract, piece and parcel of land, and church building and premises, known as Williamsville Methodist Church and Cemetery, situate, lying and being in Milford Hundred, Kent County and the State of Delaware, fronting on the southerly right of way line of County Route 443, at 30 feet wide, and on the northeasterly right of way line of County Route 442, at 50 feet wide, adjoining lands of Edward L. Rust, and more particularly described as follows, to wit:
