# DELAWARE STATE FAIR,

### FOR 1889.

The Twelfth Annual Exposition of Agricultural and Mechanical Arts, and Display of Live Stock, will commence at Dover, the capital of the State, on Monday, September 30th, 1889, and continue one week.

Dover is favorably located on the Delaware Railroad; easy of access from Maryland, Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

The Fair Grounds (Fairview Park) are large and attractive; the improvements substantial and ornamental. The buildings erected are commodious, giving superior advantages for the display of all kinds of Exhibits.

The railroad depot is on the grounds, and excursion tickets will be sold by the Delaware Railroad and all connecting lines at greatly reduced rates entitling the holder to admission to the grounds.

As per order from the General Freight Department of the Pennsylvania Railroad, dated June 10th, 1889, shipments for exhibition at State or County Fairs, to be held on any of the lines controlled and operated by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, will be charged regular current rates to place of exhibition, but such shipments after exhibition, if unsold and reshipped within thirty (30) days after the close of the Fair, will be returned *free* to original point of shipment, if on the above lines. Full tariff rates will be charged on exhibits forwarded from one Fair to another, the above clause in regard to free transportation applying only from the last point of exhibition to the original point of shipment. This free return will only be granted upon presentation of original p. id freight bill, and a certificate signed by the proper officer of the Fair, to the effect that the shipments are unsold exhibits. On shipments of Live Stock (other than Race Horses) which have been exhibited, and which are to be returned free, agents will have shippers execute a release, stating that the Company

will not be liable under any circumstances for a greater amount than \$5.00 per head. In case shippers decline to execute such a release, shipment will be returned only at current rates, and under the rules of the Official Classification applying on Live Stcck. This Notice does not cover the free return of Race Horses. On such shipments regular current rates will be charged in both directions. This notice will also apply to shipments to or from points on New York, Philadelphia & Norfolk Railroad.

# General Rules and Regulations.

The Fair will be open on Monday, September 30th, 1889, and continue six days.

The first day will be devoted to the reception and arrangement of articles for exhibit. During this day exhibitors only, and the necessary attendants, will be admitted to the grounds. No admission fee will be charged.

The Fair will be open in complete order on Tuesday, October 1st, at 8.30 A. M., at which time the gates will be open to the public generally.

### Entries.

No entry fee charged on exhibits except in the horse and carriage departments.

All Entries must be made on or before Sept 23, 1889.

Entries may be made either by letter or in person, after the first of September, by addressing the Secretary at his office in Dover, where he will be prepared to make entries and give out the *numbers* to which competitors are entitled, and all competitors will please furnish as complete lists as possible of their intended exhibits to the Secretary, by mail or otherwise, as soon after September first as practical. By so doing, much delay will be avoided when they arrive at the Fair Grounds.

Stock and all articles entered must be on the grounds by 5 P. M., of Monday, September 30th, 1889.

On and after Monday, September 30th, the Secretary's office will be at the Fair Grounds.

The Fair Grounds will be open for the reception of articles on the 23d day of September, and they may be shipped to the care of the Secretary.

Freight and express charges on all articles sent for exhibition, must be prepaid.

Application for space in the Bazaar Building, Carriage and Machinery Departments should be made as early as possible.

Exhibitors of implements and machinery are requested to ship such articles as are intended for exhibition as early as possible, so as to give ample time for transportation.

Every reasonable effort will be made by the officers of the Society and those in charge of the grounds to protect the property on exhibition from loss or damage, but the Society will not hold itself responsible should loss or damage occur.

Articles which are the products of the soil must be entered in the name of the producer of the same.

Every animal must be entered for competition in the name of the owner.

On the entry of each animal or article, a card will be furnished the exhibitor specifying the name of exhibitor, the class, and the number of the entry, which card must remain attached to the article or animal, pen or coop, during the exhibition.

Entries of articles not enumerated in this Premium List will be classed as *Specials*, and graded by awarding committees according to merit. Such grading, however, will not entitle Special exhibits to premiums, except at the discretion of the Executive Committee.


No animal or article will be entitled to a place on the grounds until the entry shall have been made as above.

Stock of all kinds must have been owned by the party in whose name they are exhibited, for at least thirty days before exhibition; and satisfactory proof of such ownership must be furnished the Judges, if required.

Such statements and copies of pedigrees as are required to be examined must be in possession of the jury on pedigrees, when the animals are on exhibition.

A single animal may be exhibited as one of a herd or pair, and in sweepstakes in his class, but shall not otherwise be entered in more than one lot.

Articles without merit will not be placed in competition,

## EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES.

Exhibitors must see to the delivery of their articles upon the fair grounds, and take charge of them at the close of the exhibition.

No exhibitor will be permitted to remove his articles until the close of the Fair, except on the order of the Superintendent of the Department in which his stock or articles may be entered.

The Society will appoint experts to act as Judges in the several departments. The Judges will report to the Executive Committee at the Secretary's office at 10 o'clock, A. M., Tuesday, October 1st.

All reports should be made in full, and meritorious articles should have deserving notices of their good qualities.

Judges should not take their books from the grounds, but leave them with the Superintendent each night, from whom they may be obtained when the examinations are to be resumed. Superintendents will see this rule enforced.

Competitors for premiums cannot be present during the examination of the Judges, unless specially requested by them.

Judges must confine their awards to the premiums offered by the Society. NO JUDGE OR SUPERINTENDENT is authorized to make any additions or alterations; premiums may be RECOMMENDED to be paid for meritorious articles not named in the premium list, but the Society reserves the exclusive control in such cases as to awards.

Judges are requested to withhold awards if the articles or animal is not deserving; WHERE THERE IS NO COMPETITION, MERIT MUST BE CONSID-ERED, TO SECURE A PREMIUM.

As soon as the Judges complete their awards, they are requested to hand their reports to the Superintendent.

## RULES APPLICABLE TO ANIMALS.

If it is ascertained that an animal is entered in a class in which it does not properly belong, it is the duty of the Superintendent of the Department to instruct the Judges not to award a premium.

Exhibitors of animals must place their names and address, and the name of the particular breed to which each animal belongs, and its age, in a conspicuous place in their respective stalls or pens. It is the duty of the Superintendent of the Department to see that this rule is enforced.

When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter or bridle, and in charge of the owner or groom.

Straw and hay will be furnished at convenient points on the grounds without charge. Food for stock can be purchased at market rates on the grounds. For information, apply to the Superintendent of forage, at his

The Officers and Superintendents of Departments will be designated by ROSETTES, viz: President, Old Gold ; Secretary, Blue ; Treasurer, Yellow; General Superintendent, Red; Superintendents of Departments, White . Marshal of Ring, Silver. Assistants will wear ribbons of the same colors as heads of departments to which they are attached. Judges, Red White and Blue.

#### POLICE.

A strong and efficient police force, under the direction of the General Superintendent, assisted by a corps of detectives, will be on duty night and day.

No betting, gambling, or drinking will be permitted on or in the vicinity of the grounds. Intoxicated persons will be promptly arrested and duly prosecuted.

No booth, stall, or tent, or other place for the sale of food, or other things, will be allowed outside the grounds within the distance of one quarter of a mile from the grounds.

Attention is called to the Law passed by the Legislature, giving the Board ample police powers within the Fair Grounds of the Association. and also within the distance of one-fourth mile beyond and surrounding said Fair Grounds, to arrest and remove therefrom, all disorderly persons whom they shall find disturbing the peace, or unlawfully interfering with the conduct and progress of any such Fair or Exhibition.

It is the purpose of the Board to maintain and enforce the good order which characterized the last Fair.



#### PAYMENT OF PREMIUMS.

Checks for cash premiums will be paid promptly by the Society. The medals will be executed and ready for delivery by December 1, 1898.

All persons entitled to premiums are requested to notify the Secretary if the same are not received sixty days after the expiration of the Fair.


The Association thinks it but just and fair in case of bad weather and consequent loss thereby that exhibitors and premium holders should be partners in our misfortune and should consent to have their premiums reduced or remitted, since we have to depend for our revenue on gate admissions.

The Society calls special attention to the lengthy and very attractive list of special premiums offered by the business men of Dover, Wilmington, New York, Philadelphia and other cities. These premiums will be awarded on Friday, September 16, the last day of the Fair, and will be distributed in the Cereal Building by the Superintendents of the different departments. #### THE TREASURER

#### ADMISSION.

Attention is called to the law passed by the Legislature giving the Board ample police powers within the Fair Grounds of the Association, and also within the distance of one-fourth of a mile beyond and surrounding said Fair Grounds, to arrest and remove therefrom all disorderly persons whom they shall find disturbing the peace, or unlawfully interfering with the conduct and progress of any such Fair or Exhibition.

It is the purpose of the Board to maintain and enforce the good order which characterized the Last Fair.

### NOTICE TO ALL EXHIBITORS

Because of fire regulations, and also to keep the buildings and grounds neater around the exhibit buildings, cars or trucks will not be allowed to park on any of the streets or around any of the exhibit buildings. Your cooperation in helping us to make this Fair more attractive will be greatly appreciated. Exhibitors may go to their buildings to unload supplies before 10:00 A.M. and between 5:00 and 6:00 P.M. When your supplies are unloaded you will proceed immediately to the area set aside for exhibitors and officials to park.

All exhibitors with entries to bring in will enter the grounds thru the main parking lot gate. Keep in right lane. Follow signs to exhibitor's parking lot. When leaving proceed north on Raughley Avenue, make a left turn on Holloway Ave. and exit through Gate #4 (near Killen Grain). This gate will be an "Out" gate only.

#### CAMPING IN GROVE AREA

Trucks, trailers, campers and tents will be placed in the grove area east of the livestock area. Requests for space must be made at time of making entries. Trailers over 30 ft. cannot be accommodated.







### PARKING INSTRUCTIONS

In an effort to be more safety conscious and to improve the appearance of the grounds, vehicles will not be allowed to park on the inside of the fairgrounds proper at the 1991 Fair. Those exhibitors and concessionaires who need to make deliveries to their exhibit area or concession space, will be required to do so prior to 12 Noon each day. After this time, all vehicles will be required to park in a special exhibitor lot as designated in the main parking lot. Due to the lack of tack stalls, a limited number of horse trailers (not to exceed 18 feet in length) will be allowed to be parked in a designated area in the vicinity of the horse arena and may be used for storage. See Horse Superintendent for proper authority. Exhibitors may not use golf carts or any similar type vehicles on the grounds. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

### **CAMPING ON THE GROUNDS**

A limited number of camping spaces will again be offered to those wishing to camp during the length of the Fair. As is customary, spaces will be offered first to those who were with us last year. Thereafter, as space permits, spaces will be allocated on a first come-first served basis with preference being given to exhibitors. New requests for space may be made anytime during the year.

All persons remaining on the grounds overnight must get an overnight badge through their department superintendent. Those who are not exhibitors must come to the main office to receive their authorization.

Vehicle parking will not be allowed in the camping area.

### **PREMIUMS & AWARDS**

Every effort will be made to see that there are no errors made in the payment of premiums. However, if an error is found by an exhibitor, proof of such error must be in writing to the Delaware State Fair on or before October 1, 1991. After this date no corrections will be considered. A \$5 charge will be made for re-issuing all lost checks or checks not cashed within 60 days of issue date. CHECKS NOT CASHED WITHIN 90 DAYS OF ISSUE WILL NOT BE RE-ISSUED.

### **ADVERTISING**

No person will be permitted to distribute advertising matter upon the grounds except from their place of business or exhibit space. The tacking or posting of an advertisement, bills, etc. other than within the space occupied by exhibits is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, flyers and heralds will not, under any circumstances, be permitted. Anyone violating this rule is liable to fine or expulsion from the grounds. Begging, soliciting, singing, or public speaking are positively prohibited.

#### Centennial - 100 years of family fun.

"Well, the history says that they're a group of guys, Harringtonians, that sit around, congregated around the old train station a lot. And, one thing led to another and I guess given the agriculture in the area and the interest in those guys, they conversely decided to start a fair. And they proceeded to do that acquiring a little bit of acreage where the present fair exists and then growing out from that as more people got interested and they established a board of directors and got shareholders involved. But it did grow out of that idea from around the old train station," General Manager from 1992-2008 and Fair Director Dennis Hazzard said in the video.

The Greater Harrington Historical Society has also had an exhibit of their own for many years inside its museum on Fleming Street, honoring the impact of that fateful meeting.

"The fair has meant a lot to Harrington and I can remember many years going there as a child and every business in the town of Harrington closed at 1 o'clock during fair week so employees could go out to the fair. It was a social gathering back in the '50s and '60s. Women did not wear shorts and jeans like we do today. And it is fun to go out there and sit and talk and visit with people that you sometimes don't see but year to year at the fair. It means a lot to the community of Harrington," Director of the Greater Harrington Historical Society Viva Poore said in the centennial video.

Shortly after the fair's inception as the Kent and Sussex Fair, automobile racing was introduced in 1921, according to fair officials. The tradition continues today.

The idea of parades at the fair began in 1924 when it was decided that an agricultural parade and pageant should be held.

With tradition in mind, a parade of champions will be held on the last day of this year's fair at 6 p.m. featuring the grand and reserve winners. "The parading of livestock... This is something that hasn't been done in quite some time, since probably the '20s or '30s," Mr. Aguilar said.

The first several decades of the fair included variety and vaudeville shows as entertainment until 1957 when the Grandstand "made its debut," according to Mr. Aguilar in the commemorative video.

The fair even hired its first headlining act, The Mariners. The gospel group made up of four men were the first official act to grace the new stage.

Later on, the '60s proved transformative for the Kent and Sussex Fair when the organization purchased the "Delaware State Fair" name from a group previously running a different fair in the Elsmere area, according to the Hagley Museum in Wilmington.

Soon after, an official camping area was established at the fair in 1967 as its success continued to grow. Attractions grew, as well, many of which arrived via train drawing crowds from all over.

"It was very convenient. They would pull up in the train yard there in Harrington and unload by truck. Some of the things would come off the rail car and go off the truck and over to the fair grounds. It was guite a... I mean people used to come in and watch the train unload. It was like the circus train coming to town years ago. It was quite an event. I believe it was either a 25 or 30 car train that would pull up into Harrington," Mr. Hazzard said in the video with a smile.

Despite 100 years' worth of changes at the Delaware State Fair, tradition and fellowship remain the same with a family-friendly atmosphere.

Fair officials will celebrate the occasion with fair goers by distributing 3,000 free butterscotch treats daily, for a total of 30,000 throughout the week, instead of giving out birthday cake since everyone is on the go. They will also celebrate the centennial year with \$5 admissions on opening day, Thursday, July 18.

And in full Delaware State Fair fashion, eight out of 10 nights this year will end in a spectacular display of fireworks with an extravaganza show Saturday, July 27 to bid adieu to 100 years of family fun and hello to years to come.







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

# **Slots bring funds for upgrades**

In 1995, one year after the General Assembly approved allowing slot machines in Delaware, the board of directors for the Delaware State Fair held a vote on bringing video gambling to Harrington Raceway. Despite strong opposition from some quarters, particularly many churchgoers in the conservative communities in southern Kent and northern Sussex counties, the board decided by one vote to open slots.

That outcome was, according to a history of the fair, the result of a bitter fight that led to the resignation of the event's president. It also may have saved the fair.

The 2019 publication "Treasured Tradition," a celebration of the fair on its 100th anniversary, says the raceway was struggling financially at that time to the point that it was dependent on loans from the fair. The fairgrounds, meanwhile, were badly in need of repairs and renovations, according to the book.

The addition of slots brought in millions early on, and much of that money was reinvested in the fair itself.

Nearly a quarter-century later, the raceway continues to pay rent to the fair, which controls about three-fourths of the raceway's stock.

With the new revenue, fair officials were able to make much-sought-after upgrades, including constructing the Quillen Arena, ice rink, exhibit hall, barns and an office building, according to former fair General Manager Gary Simpson and the Delaware State News' archives.

Over the years, those buildings have hosted countless visitors, including many of the four-legged kind, and some structures have seen use out of season. In addition to holding concerts, the Quillen Arena has even been the site of a political rally, with several thousand people flocking to it in 2016 when Donald Trump visited just days before the state's presidential primary.


Thanks to the slots, fair officials had an influx of money, and among the upgrades made as a result of the new resources was one that was surely welcome: more paved roads.

"I remember my wife used to bring our kids out on the fairgrounds and they were dirt roads. Not all of them were dirt roads, I don't mean that, but the carnival area was dirt and they would come home and just be filthy," Mr. Simpson, who also served in the state Senate from 1998 to 2018, recalled last month.

Mr. Simpson was one of those original dissenters on slots, joining with the contingent on the board of directors who voted against bringing gambling to Harrington. Perhaps needless to say, he now believes the introduction of the video lottery was a boon to Harrington and the state fair.

Few people are more qualified to discuss the evolution of the fair in the second half of the 20th century than Mr. Simpson, who's been attending the event for more than 60 years and is the namesake of a road running along the fair's west side.

While the festival has grown and quite a few attractions have been added since the early years, one aspect remains the same.

"I think it's retained its agriculture heritage. Otherwise, it would just be an entertainment park," Mr. Simpson said.

The fair has been a Delaware icon for a century, and it continues to inform visitors about the valuable role agriculture plays in society.

Today, the Delaware State Fair stretches about 300 acres, with more than 20 buildings, and it regularly brings in around 300,000 people — approximately 30 percent of the state's population - every summer. Even as other carnivals, expos and fetes have come and gone, the Delaware State Fair has remained.

That longevity might not have been possible without the introduction of slots, however, and the raceway might not have added gambling without the determination of Bill Chambers, who was president of the board of directors at the time of the 1995 vote and cast the tie-breaking ballot.

It's almost ironic, really, that what many feared would permanently change the fair - and not for the better - may have been what enabled it to keep thriving.

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

# Fair stages gamut of entertainment



As a story in the Delaware State News reported, "With dark gray Last year, Toby Keith became the storm clouds hovering overhead through the air, the Charlie Daniels Band tore into the opening chords of 'Drinking My Baby Goodbye.'"

It was the first song in what was supposed to be an hour-long set as they opened for Lynyrd Skynyrd in a sold-out show.

But before the band could finish formed its fourth concert last year its second song, the skies opened as part of the Southern Uprising and unleashed a heavy downpour Tour with Travis Tritt, The Marshall on the fairgrounds, saturating fans as they frantically ran for cover.

#### the stage, never to return.

"The people here tell me that for your safety and ours, we need to get off the stage and you all need to take shelter," Mr. Daniels told the crowd.

Around 9:30 p.m., after waiting more than an hour in the rain for the band's return, fans were told that Lynyrd Skynyrd would soon perform. But fans who came to see the Daniels band were none too happy. A fair spokeswoman said it was the band's decision not to continue.

That fall, Mr. Daniels came back to the area to perform at Punkin Chunkin in Millsboro and talked about his regret over the canceled show.

"We were very disappointed. We don't like to go somewhere and not get the job done," he said.

Country rapper Colt Ford performed with Justin Moore back in 2012.

In a State News story, he talked about how people didn't perceive what he did as country music and compared himself to Mr. Daniels.

"There are people who say that what I do isn't country. But I just have to ask them 'What country are you from?'" he said of his records, which have debuted in the top 10 in the Country charts.

Mr. Ford, whose real name is Jason Brown, was quick to point out that his sing-speak style is a time-honored tradition in country music.

"That's what's funny. I ain't created nothing new. Talking records have been around forever," he said. "There were guys like Charlie Daniels and Johnny Cash doing it before me. Do I have my own twist on it? Sure, that's what an artist is supposed to do. I think it's boring when you can't tell one guy apart from another guy."

Mr. Gilbert has been a popular draw at the fair. He told the Delaware State News prior to his last performance in 2017 how

much he likes the setting that a state fair can provide.

"It's been hard to put a finger on it exactly. The environment of an arena has its benefits since you can control the weather. But being outside, I think people can let their hair down a little more and things become a little bit more organic," he said.

His fans, known as BG Nation, are consistently voted the most devoted group in country music.

"I try to wrap my mind around that. And all I can tell you is God's been good to me. I think part of that is the fact I try to be as open and honest in my music as I can. People grab onto that and that's pretty cool," he said.

#### On the way up

The fair has also seen its share of rising country stars who have gone on to have blockbuster careers.

Most notably, in 2007, Taylor Swift, along with Kellie Pickler, opened for Mr. Paisley.

Back in December of 2012, the Delaware State Fair announced that Florida Georgia Line would open for country superstar Luke Bryan on the fair's first night. At that point, the duo's first studio album "Here's to the Good Times" had just barely been released and their eventual mega-hit single "Cruise" was still climbing the charts.

By the time they got to the fair, on a July night in 2013, "Here's to the Good Times" had gone gold, earning the highest debut album sales of 2012 for a new country artist.

Since then, millions have records have been sold and the awards have piled up.

Later in that year, the band embarked on its first headlining tour.

"We are real excited about taking the next step," said Tyler Hubbard, the Monroe, Georgia, half of Florida Georgia Line, at the time. "It really can't get here fast enough.

"We don't take too many breaks. We like to stay busy. That's what it's all about — taking advantage of a situation that's out there for us and just trying to hit a home run every night."

Country star Jon Pardi rolled into Harrington in 2017 fresh off of an Academy of County Music award for Best New Artist. He headlined a Delaware State Fair concert with Chris Lane that year.

His fans, the Pardi Animals, were out in force for him that night.

"We've been playing the clubs since 2011 and it's been great. We're getting more and more people on board and I'm really happy that the fans are with us and more people are noticing. It really gives you the drive to keep going," he told the Delaware State News.

#### **Hometown heroes**

There have been a few Delaware natives who have taken the big stage at the fair.

Country singer Chuck Wicks of Smyrna played the fair in 2009 with his then-girlfriend Julianne Hough and Darius Rucker.

More than 200 family members and friends were in the audience courtesy of tickets bought by former Smyrna School District superintendent and Mr. Wicks' aunt Debbie Wicks

Mr. Wicks was pumped to play for them on a night that saw

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
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
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

showers roll in and out.

"There's definitely a different kind of energy (playing in Delaware). You want to make everyone proud," he said.

Milton native and Cape Henlopen High graduate Jimmie Allen opened for Mr. Keith during last year's record-breaking show.

Local fans were excited to see him and he was happy to see them as well.

"I remember going to the state fair a lot as a kid. It was the thing to do in the summer," he told the Delaware State News later in the year.

"The good thing about the fair is that it's not super expensive and it's all about the family. You got to play games and you just had to eat funnel cake. It was a fair staple.'

He said he discovered late in 2017 that the tour would take nim to Harrington.

"I was super excited when I found out. To play in Delaware with a guy that I used to listen to while growing up in Delaware was pretty crazy," he said.

The night before the fair show, he joined country star Jake Owen for a song during Mr. Owen's concert at Hudson Fields in his hometown of Milton.

But the biggest Delawarean to play a show at the Delaware State Fair was blues legend George Thorogood in 2016.

He had only one request prior to his first show in Harrington. Keep those mosquitoes away.

"Delaware mosquitoes are the worst. They are deadlier than the cobras in India," he told the Delaware State News in the days leading up to the show.

It was only his second time playing in Kent County. The first was at the Dover Air Force Base when he was in high school.

"The lead singer from another band copped out of a show for the servicemen down there. So they asked me to fill in," he said.

"It was a strange thing. The Vietnam War was raging at the time and soldiers' bodies were coming out of the Air Force

base every day. The whole world was watching. And maybe that's why the lead singer copped out.

"But the show went rather well. The servicemen were just like a regular crowd so it went pretty smoothly. But it was a strange experience to be down there at the time. Something I'll never forget."

His state fair concert, which was preceded by The Fabulous Thunderbirds, was also unforgettable for his legions of Downstate fans.

Mr. Thorogood improvised a little during his song "One Bourbon, One Scotch and One Beer," saying he was on his way to the "Friday night rock party in Delaware ... Delaware, the world's best kept secret ... yeah, the First State" as the crowd roared.

He seemed to enjoy being back in his home state.

"We have never had the pleasure of playing the Delaware State Fair," he said late in the show that night. "We hope this is the start of a beautiful relationship. ... It took us 40 years to get here and we're going to enjoy every sweet second of it."

### Pop goes the fair

Pop music of the day, whatever era the fair was in, has always been, well, popular.

From big bands and singer/TV talk show host Mike Douglas to Gloria Estefan and Milli Vanilli, to Color Me Badd and Gin Blossooms to Meghan Trainor and Kesha, the fair has tried to cater to the prevailing taste of the day.

None was bigger than in 1989 when New Kids on the Block and Tiffany broke a fair record by selling out two nights at the Delaware State Fair.

Later years have seen "American Idol" finalists such as Kelly Clarkson, David Cook and Clay Aiken take the stage.

In 2004, Mr. Aiken's concert in Harrington marked his first performance at a state fair and his second show in Delaware.

In June of that year, he performed a benefit concert at Dover Downs, and also sang the national anthem at the then-Nextel Cup NASCAR race at Dover International Speedway.

He said at the time he had a great time in Delaware, and looked forward to returning to the First State.

"When I was here before, it was jam packed with people," he said, referring to all the race fans. "But it's a very pretty, very nice state."

#### Memories made

While catering to the youngsters of the day, the fair has welcomed older acts for those who wanted to groove to tunes of their childhood.

Chubby Checker twisted the night away while Styx and Cheap Trick paid a visit, as well as three concerts over the years with the Beach Boys. New Kids on the Block returned in 2015 to sing their familiar tunes to folks who also presumably saw them 16 years prior.

Grand Funk Railroad, with songs such as "We're An American Band," "I'm Your Captain/Closer To Home," "Locomotion" and "Some Kind Of Wonderful," headlined the fair's 2015 craft beer festival.

Founding member and drummer Don Brewer told the Delaware State News that year that he was happy to keep rocking in places like Harrington.

"You never really think about it until it's staring you straight in the face," he said.

#### **Giving hope**

For about the last decade, the Delaware State Fair has catered to the faith-based community by offering concerts by top-selling Christian artists.

Performers have included Casting Crowns and For King and Country, each twice; Lauren Daigle; and Jeremy Camp.

Bill Sammons, general manager of 88.7 The Bridge radio station out of Milford, whose station sponsors many of the shows, told the Delaware State News in 2016 that it is simply the positive messages the songs provide that attract such a crowd.

"In one word- hope," Mr. Sammons said. "It's a positive style of music and it gives people hope.

"There's a lot of really negative stuff going on in our world and people want a respite from that sometimes and they want something they can find some peace and some hope in and Christian music offers that."





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
