H'y. NAAMAN'S CREEK - Named for Indian Chief, 1655. Chief Peminacka of the Minqua tribe deeded large tract of land along Naaman's Creek to John Risingh, Governor of New Sweden. Noted Swedish artists, Gustavus Hesselius and Adolph Ulric Wertmuller, lived on plantations on this creek. ✓

H'y. NAAMAN'S BRIDGE - First bridge built before 1682. Used by Swedes, Dutch and English before the coming of Penn, being road from Fort Casimir (now New Castle) to Upland (now Chester) and Tinicum. Second bridge built in 1800. Toll-bridge until 1832. ~~Present bridge built 1917.~~ ✓

Bronze ENTRANCE - OLD SWEDES' CHURCHYARD - Established by the first Swedish settlers. Oldest grave^{stone} dated 1656. Graves of especial interest: Reorus Torkillus, died 1643. First Missionary in New Sweden. Peter Tranberg, 1696-1748. Swedish Pastor. Peter Jaquett, 1751-1831. Officer in Revolutionary War. James A. Bayard, 1767-1815. U. S. Senator 1804. Commissioner for Treaty of Ghent, 1814. Richard H. Bayard, 1796-1868. First Mayor of Wilmington, 1832. U. S. Senator, 1836. Chief Justice of Delaware, 1839. James A. Bayard, Jr., 1790-1830. U. S. Senator, 1856. Thomas F. Bayard, 1826-1898. U. S. Senator, 1869. Secretary of State, 1886. Ambassador to England, 1893. Mary Vining, 17 -1821. "The Beauty of Delaware in Revolutionary times. ~~MARKET BETWEEN SECOND AND THIRD STREETS - FIRST WILMINGTON PRISON -~~
~~First Wilmington prison, known as the "Cage", built in 1740 near~~
~~this spot. A one-story brick house twelve feet square and eight feet~~
~~high with two apartments - one for male and one for female prisoners -~~
~~with no windows nor chimney. Light and air came through grating one~~
~~foot square in the door.~~

~~1800 MARKET STREET - JOSEPH TATNALL HOUSE - Built about 1760.~~
Anthony Wayne's headquarters ~~in~~ 1777. Generals Washington, Lafayette,
Wayne, and other officers met here to hold council and hear reports
prior to ~~the~~ Battle of Brandywine. Later occupied by ~~the~~ British.
Joseph Tatnall owned and operated ~~the~~ original flour mills on the ^{See}

FRIENDS' CEMETERY, FOURTH AND WEST STREETS - JOHN DICKINSON - In this
cemetery lie the mortal remains of John Dickinson, lawyer, statesman,
and scholar. Born at Crosiadore near Trappe in Talbot County, Mary-
