THE PROPERTY AND OPIGINAL (If from DUVIGAL ADDIABANCE										

The main body of the Clearfield Farm House is a four-bay, two-story plus attic structure, one room deep. A lower wing continues the axis of the main body, and is joined to a cross-axis rear wing.

The front, or west facade, is laid in Flemish bond with a stretcher belt course below the second-story windows, and with a beveled water course. Located in the north center bay of the facade, the entry is surmounted by a rectangular light and covered by a simple pedimented portico. The roof is symmetrically balanced with two dormers and two chimneys, which occur at the north and south walls.

The north and south facades are stuccoed and lack fenestration on the two main floors.

The rear, or east facade, lacks the ordered geometry of the front. It is composed of only three bays and the windows are of various dimensions. One dormer, set between the two south bays, pierces the roof.

On the first floor a hall provides access to two flanking rooms, as well as egress to the east and west. The west, or frontage, windows are larger than the east, and have slightly splayed casings. Simple detailing is prevalent throughout.

Providing access to the second floor is a staircase which divides into two stairways at right angles to the lower case. To each side the stair provides access to two rooms, one located in each bay of the main portion of the house. To the north, an east hall provides communication with the lower wing and houses an enclosed winding stair leading to the attic.

The attic is finished in plaster over lath with beaded tongue-ingroove floor decking. The basement is contained by brick foundation walls, and is marked by two fireplaces. Beyond the south foundation wall is a brick vaulted room. Remains of a pent cave or gallery porch can be detected in the brickwork below the belt courses on the east and west facades.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			

David Clark, captain in the Delaware Militia, began amassing an estate in what was to become Blackbird Hundred, New Castle County, in 1755, when Isaac England deeded him a tract of land in Appoquinimink Hundred called New Bristol. England's grandparents, Joseph and Rebecca England, had received confirmation of patent on the land from William Penn on the nineteenth of May, 1791.

The year of the conveyance of the tract probably dates the construction of the Clark homestead on Clearfield Farm. David Clark's son, William, a military man like his father, was the second generation to occupy the house. As a colonel in the state militia, William led a company that took heavy losses in the battle of Monmouth.

Although William's son, John, also attained the rank of colonel in the state militia, he is better known as the twentieth Governor of Delaware Clark was elected in 1816 on the ticket of the Federalist Party, and served for three years between 1817 and 1820. His wife was not new to politics, being the daughter of one of her husband's predecessors, John Cook. John Clark died a year after leaving office, and was buried in the Presbyterian graveyard south of Smyrna, the town where he was accustomed to transact business. His home is currently maintained as a headquarters of the Department of Corrections.
