LAND WARRANT GRANTED TO JAMES TULLY

I **RHOADS SHANKLAND Esquire** surveyor of Sussex County aforesaid, greeting whereas application has been made unto me by **JAMES TULLY** the county aforesaid.

Pursuant to the direction of an act of the General Assembly of the State of Delaware aforesaid instituted an act for opening and establishing a Land Office within this State, and for the sale of all vacant and uncultivated lands therein to grant him a warrant for the purpose of surveying and locating a piece or parcel of vacant lands, situated, lying, and being in **BROAD CREEK HUNDRED** in the county aforesaid, contiguous and adjoining the applicants tract of land on the North East side thereof called and known by the name of **CYPRUS SWAMPS**.

These an therefore authorize and require you to survey and locate, on lands to be surveyed and located, for the use of the said **JAMES TULLY**, his heirs or assigns the aforesaid vacant and in part cultivated and improved land (not exceeding the quantity of two hundred acres and return a plot thereof containing the courses and distances of the several lines and description of the bound and creeks, borders, and rivulets surveyed, or lying within the lines of the said plot, the names of the owners of the contiguous or adjoining lands, and the quantity of land thereby surveyed to the examiner appointed and confirmed by the Governor agreeably to the direction of the above written act of the General Assembly , and for your so doing this shall be your sufficient **WARRANT**, Given under my hand and seal of office at Georgetown, this twenty eighth day of March in the year of our Lord, One Thousand, Seven Hundred, and

Ninety Four, **And of the independence** of the United States of America the Eighteenth.
