

Then the dream was translated into the reality of an idea on paper, a design. Words were put together in a proposal for state and federal funds, and the dream started on the road to existence.

The funds were granted - three million dollars in equal amounts from the Economic Development Administration of the United States Department of Commerce and from the General Assembly of the State of Delaware. The architectural plans were drawn, the contractors chosen, the construction


Last month, classes moved from the main building to the first significant addition on the eight-year-old Southern Campus of Delaware Technical and Community College.

The term that defined its purpose - the multi-occupational learning resource complex - was so long that it was shortened familiarly to "Mighty Mo" by those on campus who watched it grow.

The adjective "mighty" will be justified when the educational and training programs have their designed impact on the mid-Peninsula.

In the original dream mentioned above were considerations of these facts:

- the 1970 Census revealed that many of the adult population of Sussex County and nearby Maryland had less than a ninth-grade education:
- the area is destined for growth, in population, in tourism, in industry and commerce:
- . . . in today's technological society, the College has a responsibility to help in that growth by offering educational opportunities to meet the needs of the present and of the future.



In this early part of 1975, the employment scene is far from rosy. Perhaps this is the time - for the unemployed, the underemployed and Veterans - to use their enforced leisure in training for that better future.

As this ceremony of dedication goes on, these programs are already in operation:

. . . basic career education in reading, writing, mathematics, related to training in various occupations;

... power sewing machine operation

. . . data processing/key punch . . . air conditioning and heating

. . . truck-driver training

. . . diesel/automotive mechanics

. . . heavy equipment operation

Soon to start are programs in:

. . . plant maintenance mechanic

. . . auto front-end specialist

. . . auto air-conditioning specialist

. . . auto electrical-system specialist





In a recent nationally syndicated column, Ernest B. Furgurson reviewed help-wanted ads in newspapers and found that the majority of firms needing new employees were asking for those with specific, modern skills sales, computer programmers, nurses and technicians. He said, "If you get yourself a skill, a trade, you have something no one can take away. If you have none, you are just so much filler material in the job market." And he added "the job training approach looks more sensible every day. Potentially it should take those who are least trainable off the jobless rolls and put them into slots in private industry, and be a long-range asset."

Delaware Technical and Community College joins other Delaware citizens in subscribing to these beliefs, and is taking giant steps to implement them.

The College welcomes your interest in its future; it asks your continued support of its programs as an expression of faith and hope in a better future for Sussex County and Delaware.

In Georgetown, seat of the government of Sussex County, in the State of Delaware, the Sussex County Council does hereby advise that:

WHEREAS recognition is due our neighbor, Delaware Technical And Community College Southern Campus, our ally in striving for excellence, our area's important educational asset, and

WHEREAS the College opened for its first class in September of 1967 and has since proved to be of inestimable value to all the people in this area, and


