a short time by the Rev. Moses Little, a union was again effected in 1767, with the churches at Lewes and Cool Spring, and the Rev. Matthew Wilson then became the pastor, serving the three congregations until his death. In 1788 these congregations were incorporated under the provisions of the act of 1787, with the name of "The United Presbyterian Congregations of Lewes, Cool Spring and Indian River." All their temporalities were thus united, and for a number of years "they called and paid their pastors in the name of the trustees of this Directory,"

In 1800 the ruling elders of the congregation were Robert Houston, Benjamin Prettyman, David Richards and Jacob Burton. In 1811, Edward Hall and William Rodney were elected, and in 1836 the session was composed of Dr. S. K. Wilson, C. Waples, P. Marvel, Aaron Marvel and Peter Waples. At this time the communicants numbered sixty-eight, and the Rev. Cornelius H. Mustard was the pastor. In 1811 the membership was still stronger, there being seventy-four communicants. After the latter period the congregation appears to have declined very rapidly, and was soon so weak that no regular minister could be maintained, the Rev. Henry Fries being the last to serve in that relation. The Civil War still further disrupted the church, which has not had an active existence since that time.

The place of worship of the congregation was in a meeting-house erected on the Frame farm, one and a half miles about Millsboro', an acre of land in a fine grove having been set aside for this purpose. The first building was replaced by a better frame structure in 1794, which was well finished, the interior being of heart pine, in panel work, while the entire outside was covered with cypress shingles. In 1888 it was repaired for the last time, and after 1866 was practically abandoned. In 1887 the frame of the building was still standing, but most of the lumber entering into the construction of the building had been carried away, and the cemetery was no longer used.

The Methodist Episcopal Church has had an active, aggressive membership in the hundred for more than eighty years, and in 1887 it was stronger numerically than all the other denominations combined. An account of its work in this division embraces the history of five white and three colored churches. Of these, "Zoar" and "Unity" both appear to have been built in 1810; but the organization of the classes occupying them, as parts of old Lawes Circuit, was undoubtedly a number of years earlier.

ZOAR was incorporated November 5, 1810, with fifteen families represented, among them being those of William Ennis, Asa Johnson, Jeremiah Joseph, Thomas Grice, Peter Mayer, John Sharp, Spencer Lacy and Isaac Atkins. A frame, shingle-covered meeting-house was built, on the main road, several miles north of Millsboro'. This house was a regular place of worship many years, but it now stands neglected. Its further regular use was made unnecessary by the changes in population and the building of Bethesda Church, in Dagsborough Hundred, to accommodate most of the members formerly attendants at Zoar. On the church lot is a small burial lot, and the building is yet occasionally used for funerals and other gatherings.

THE UNITY CHURCH was built on sixty square perches of land deeded Sept. 22, 1810, to Trustees Selick Hazzard, David Hazzard, Perry Pool, James Lingo and Thomas McIlvaine, by Arthur Milby, The original house was rebuilt in 1842, and this, in turn, gave place to a new church, in the fall of 1887. It is a frame house, thirty by forty feet, with eighteen feet posts, and was erected by a building committee composed of Daniel C. Townsend, John H. Prettyman, Robert Burton, Joshua Burton and Rev. Robert Rowe. It was finished plainly and cost one thousand dollars. The church has a central location at the hamlet of Fairmount.

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH is in the northwestern part of the hundred, at Johnson's Cross-Roads, and has a pleasant site in a well-kept cemetery which is inclosed by a substantial brick wall.

The church is a frame building, which was erected during the ministry of the Rev. John Hough, on the Georgetown Circuit, of which it still forms a part. Prior to its occupancy meetings were held at the houses of James Johnson, John Walls and the schoolhouse. John Walls was still living in this locality in the fall of 1887 at the age of eighty-eight years, and was one of the earliest Methodists in this part of the county.

The church was plain but not unattractive, and had these trustees—Albert J. Johnson, John Walls, Josiah Simpler, Paynter Frame, G. S. Walls, K. D. Wilson, Joseph W. Wimbrown, Peter P. Dodd and Peter W. Rust.

CONNELLY'S CHAPEL is at the head of Angola Neck, and was built in 1837, largely through the efforts of the Rev. Connelly, who was a carpenter by trade, and who did much of the work himself. In recognition of his services the first chapel was named for him, and when the present house was built, in 1876, the title was retained. It is a plain frame, with sittings for about one hundred and fifty people, and the surroundings are neatly kept by the community. In 1887 the trustees were William Hopkins, John A. Marsh, Peter Walls, Joseph Walls, Wm. S. Robinson and Peter R Burton. The appointment is a part of the Nassau Circuit, while the Unity Church and the Central Church belong to Millsboro' Circuit. The latter was built in the upper part of Long Neck after 1867, several years elapsing before it was completed. In 1887 it was enlarged and repaired, making it an attractive country place of worship.

The colored people of the hundred maintain churches which bear the names of "Friendship," "Harmony" and Johnson's Meeting-House. The latter was built in 1879. The former has been in use more than fifty years. The churches are plain wooden structures, having good seating capacity.

Organized 1865. From 1865 to 1904 services were held in a one story frame structure on the present site. Present building was dedicated in 1904. It, too, is a one story frame structure. First settled clergyman, Rev. John H. Arkoo. 1865-81.

Organized and building dedicated in 1865. It was remodeled in 1891. It is a one story frame building with a cornerstone. First settled clergyman, Rev. P. A. Johnson, 1896-97.

Organized in 1865. First church was built in 1868 and destroyed by fire in 1915. Present building was dedicated in 1916. It is a one story frame structure. First settled clergyman, Rev. Samuel G. Waters, 1866-68.

Conley Methodist Chapel (M.E.) is located one and one-quarter miles n. e. of Angola. This church was organized in the Angola schoolhouse and was first known as "Angola M. E. Chapel." They were incorporated on Feb. 9, 1838, as "Connelly's M. E. Chapel" while still meeting in the school. In the meantime the name has been shortened to "Conley's." On Feb. 9, 1838, Dagsworthy Derrickson donated to the following trustees, D. W. Brierton, Arthur Milby, Wm. S. Hazzard, David Hazzard and Wm. S. Vessels, 671/2 sq. perches of land as a church site. It was described as being near the road to Angola Neck.

The first church was built in 1838, through the efforts of the Rev. Mr. Connelly, a carpenter by trade, for whom it was named.

The present building was erected in 1876. It was thoroughly renovated in 1901. More land was purchased on Sept. 3, 1912, from Dagsworthy D. Burton. In September, 1944, the building was sheathed with white asbestos shingles and the interior was completely renovated. There is a large graveyard enclosed with a low wall. The earliest tombstone is over the grave of Mrs. Hannah Lynch, who died on Apr. 3, 1862.

Trinity P. E. Chapel was located on the Long Neck Road south of the Millsboro-Lewes Road. The first services were started in a nearby schoolhouse, in 1845. In 1846, the Chapel of the Comforter was built on this site under the leadership of the Rev. John A. Childs. The half-acre church site was donated by James T. Bayliss, on Feb. 6, 1847, at which time the chapel was under construction.

It was a chapel-of-ease attached to St. George's Church and was consecrated on May 25, 1847, by Bishop Alfred Lee. In 1870, the church was enlarged, a recess chancel and a vestry-room being built. At that time the name "Trinity" was adopted. The building was improved in 1881 and again in 1890.

In 1891, a bell was secured and a Bishop's chair and a priest's chair were installed. New windows were installed in 1904. The steeple was wrecked in a wind-storm late in 1916. The last services were held here in 1918. The building gradually disintegrated and by 1940 it was flat upon the ground. The alldevouring forest swallowed it up and not an echo lingers to whisper of its former glory. In the meantime the wood-lot, in which it stood, has been cut over and no vestige of the chapel remains.

Central M. E. Church is located in Long Neck about two miles n. e. of Harmon's School. It was founded in 1867 and the present building was erected in 1887. This church was never very strong and in 1937 it was closed forever. At the 1941 Methodist Conference it was decided to sell the property.

Friendship M. E. Church, colored, is located about two and one-half miles s. w. of Fairmount. The present church was built in 1895. There is a small graveyard, and across the road from the church is their bush-meeting ground.

Harmony M. E. Church, colored. This church was organized in 1818. A half-acre church site was purchased on Mar. 20, 1819, from Eli Norwood. A church was built and it was located about two and one-half miles west of Friendship Church. They were incorporated on Apr. 21, 1875, while the Rev. T. H. Johnson was pastor. A new church was built in 1891. A half-acre of land for the burial-ground was purchased on June 4, 1915, from Wm. T. Hurdle. They also maintained a bush-meeting ground.

In 1940, the construction of a new church was started, one mile west of Harmon's School. The corner-stone was laid on Sept. 13, 1942. The church was completed and the opening service was held on Apr. 18, 1943.

The old church was sold to Wm. D. Burton who moved it away to convert it into a dwelling. The large well-kept graveyard was then enclosed with a cement-block wall.

In September, 1945, Mr. Burton moved the old church to the Rehoboth Road between Westcoat's Corner and Midway, to be converted into a dwelling.

Bethel Methodist Church (M.E.) of Dagsboro was built and dedicated in 1882. It was located beside the present site of Christ Methodist Church, the land having been donated on Aug. 30, 1881 by William Bright of Wilmington who owned large tracts of land at Dagsboro. The church was incorporated on Dec. 17, 1894. In 1906, the congregation decided to erect a new church and selected the site where Bethel Church now stands. They were again incorporated on June 17, 1906 and purchased land at Clayton and Hazzard Sts. on Oct. 2, 1906 from John A. Lingo. Part of the congregation wanted to retain the old site so they withdrew and joined Vine's Neck M. P. Church. It was then decided to move Vine's Neck Church to the site presented by Mr. Bright. This was done and the two churches stood side-by-side during the building of the new Bethel Church. There was considerable friction between the two congregations during this time. When the new Bethel Church was completed the old church was sold, moved away and converted into a livery stable and an ice manufacturing plant. These were later burned down. The new Bethel Church was dedicated on Sun., Nov. 3, 1906. It was rebuilt in 1925.

Christ Methodist Church (M.P.) of Dagsboro was organized in 1890. The first church was built in Vine's Neck about one and one-half miles outside of Dagsboro and called "Vine's Neck M. P. Church." They were incorporated on Nov. 1, 1898. In 1906, the building was moved to its present location in Dagsboro. It was rebuilt, in 1907, and named "Dagsboro M. P. Church." The site was donated on Feb. 6, 1907, by Geo. W. Bright of Wilmington. The name "Christ" was adopted in 1940.

The Church of the Nazarene, at Dagsboro, was organized on July 30, 1939 at a tent-meeting in charge of the Rev. W. T. Archer. He was assisted by Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Conaway, evangelists. The church was built and it was dedicated on Nov. 26, 1939. The service was in charge of the Rev. Dr. D. E. Higgs, Dist. Supt. He was assisted by the Revs. V. A. Miller, L. W. Savage, Maude A. Stuneck and W. T. Archer, the pastor.

Prince George's P. E. Chapel, at Dagsboro. There is a tradition that this chapel was established in 1706, when a log chapel was built, and that this was replaced with a frame building in 1738. The chapel was named in honor of the infant Prince George of England who was born in 1738 and who later became King George the Third.

The Church of England was established in the province of Maryland by an Act passed by the Assembly on June 2, 1692. This Act provided for the method of organization, for the support of the establishment and for the erection of churches as well as chapels-of-ease in the respective parishes.

Previous to the settlement of the boundary dispute between Delaware and Maryland, in 1767, a large section of southeastern Delaware was claimed as a part of Maryland and hence in Worcester Parish. On July 8, 1755, the Maryland Assembly passed an Act empowering the vestry of Worcester Parish to


