A history, in brief, of the nearly 900 churches and former churches in Delaware as located by the Author.

Conley Methodist Chapel (M.E.) is located one and one-quarter miles n. e. of Angola. This church was organized in the Angola schoolhouse and was first known as "Angola M. E. Chapel." They were incorporated on Feb. 9, 1838, as "Connelly's M. E. Chapel" while still meeting in the school. In the meantime the name has been shortened to "Conley's." On Feb. 9, 1838, Dagsworthy Derrickson donated to the following trustees, D. W. Brierton, Arthur Milby, Wm. S. Hazzard, David Hazzard and Wm. S. Vessels, 67½ sq. perches of land as a church site. It was described as being near the road to Angola Neck.

The first church was built in 1838, through the efforts of the Rev. Mr.

Connelly, a carpenter by trade, for whom it was named.

The present building was erected in 1876. It was thoroughly renovated in 1901. More land was purchased on Sept. 3, 1912, from Dagsworthy D. Burton. In September, 1944, the building was sheathed with white asbestos shingles and the interior was completely renovated. There is a large graveyard enclosed with a low wall. The earliest tombstone is over the grave of Mrs. Hannah Lynch, who died on Apr. 3, 1862.

Trinity P. E. Chapel was located on the Long Neck Road south of the Millsboro-Lewes Road. The first services were started in a nearby schoolhouse, in 1845. In 1846, the Chapel of the Comforter was built on this site under the leadership of the Rev. John A. Childs. The half-acre church site was donated by James T. Bayliss, on Feb. 6, 1847, at which time the chapel was under construction.

It was a chapel-of-ease attached to St. George's Church and was consecrated on May 25, 1847, by Bishop Alfred Lee. In 1870, the church was enlarged, a recess chancel and a vestry-room being built. At that time the name "Trinity" was adopted. The building was improved in 1881 and again in 1890.

In 1891, a bell was secured and a Bishop's chair and a priest's chair were installed. New windows were installed in 1904. The steeple was wrecked in a wind-storm late in 1916. The last services were held here in 1918. The building gradually disintegrated and by 1940 it was flat upon the ground. The all-devouring forest swallowed it up and not an echo lingers to whisper of its former glory. In the meantime the wood-lot, in which it stood, has been cut over and no vestige of the chapel remains.

Central M. E. Church is located in Long Neck about two miles n. e. of Harmon's School. It was founded in 1867 and the present building was erected in 1887. This church was never very strong and in 1937 it was closed forever. At the 1941 Methodist Conference it was decided to sell the property.

Friendship M. E. Church, colored, is located about two and one-half miles s. w. of Fairmount. The present church was built in 1895. There is a small graveyard, and across the road from the church is their bush-meeting ground.

Harmony M. E. Church, colored. This church was organized in 1818. A half-acre church site was purchased on Mar. 20, 1819, from Eli Norwood. A church was built and it was located about two and one-half miles west of Friendship Church. They were incorporated on Apr. 21, 1875, while the Rev. T. H. Johnson was pastor. A new church was built in 1891. A half-acre of land for the burial-ground was purchased on June 4, 1915, from Wm. T. Hurdle. They also maintained a bush-meeting ground.

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HISTORICAL RECORD

OF

NASSAU CIRCUIT

Nassau Circuit was organized in 1880. Whites Chapel and Ebenezer were a part of Lewes Circuit. Zion was taken from Milton, Connelly's Chapel was taken from Millsboro. James Carroll was the first preacher appointed by Bishop Andrews at the conference held at Dover. R.W. Todd, P.E. A Parsonage was built at Nassau in 1880 by James Carroll. At the conference held at Middletown, Del. John Waithman was appointed by Bishop Hurst.

The session of the Wilmington Annual Conference over which Bishop John F. Hurst presided, convened at Middletown March 8, 1882. Rev. John Waithman served the circuit as pastor two years, when J.N. Foreman was appointed to the Circuit by Bishop William L. Harris at the session of the conference which was held at Wilmington, Del. March 5, 1884. The present membership of the charge is 270 in full connection and thirty probationers.

The writer of these late events has served the circuit three years, and records with gratitude to God, the increasing kindness of the people.

The session of the Wilmington Conference over which Bishop Fowler presided, held at Centerville Md. 1891

J.S. Wickline was transferred from the Virginia Conference and appointed to Nassau Circuit for 1891, beginning his work at Whites Chapel on Sunday Apr. 5 and at Zion in the afternoon. He drove a horse and buggy 120 miles and traveled on boat 150 miles to reach the Circuit. J.S. Wickline was appointed to Nassau Circuit at the conference held at Middletown March 1893 for the third year.

At the conference held at Lewes March 1898, Zion appointment was taken from Nassau Circuit and attached to Milton.

Rehoboth was taken up as a regular appointment and service held in the school house. April 24, 1898 a society was organized

by the pastor J.D. Reese with thirty-two members, Capt. T.W. Steele was appointed leader and John S. Lynch Sunday School Superintendent.

A Board of Trustees was elected Aug. 25, 1898 and steps taken to build a Church. A building Committee was appointed consisting of J.D. Reese, Pastor, John S. Lynch, Jas. E. Marvel, Robert B. Foskey. The work was commenced and the building dedicated by Rev. T.E. Terry Assisting the Pastor In Aug. 1898.

Com. W.H. Shock of Wahington, D.C. took an active interest in the New Church enterprise, contributing very liberally, as did several others who spend their summers at the beach.

The Church cost \$1400.00 all of which was paid up to and at the dedication, but the sum of \$150.00. Since the dedication, fifty dollars of this amount has been pail.

1895-6 During the pastorate of Rev. G.R. Neese, Whites Chapel and Ebenezer Churches were blessed with good revivals but Bro. Neese failed to keep record of those who joined on probation so that most of the results were lost 1899-1902. During the three years pastorate of Rev. J.P. Outten, Conley's Chapel, Ebenezer and Whites were repaired and renovated and all but \$60. paid for the improvement.

The year 1901 was set apart by the Wilmington Conference for raising the conf. Academy debt. This Circuit raised its apportionment, \$150. in full.

1902-3 C.W. Strickland in charge. During the year 1902-03 a great revival swept over the circuit. At Ebenezer a good meeting resulted in 21 conversions at Conley's as old time revival came to the Church and 64 were converted at Whites Chapel 30 were converted. At Rehoboth the meeting was on of great power. Sixty seven were converted, mostly adults. Tatal for Circuit 182.

Feb. 7, 1903 At the 4th. Quarterly Conference a petition was presented from the members and friends of Rehoboth Church asking that a new Circuit parsonage be built at Rehoboth. A committee was appointed to secure a quit claim deed from Mrs. Marvel Heirs of Judge Wooten. The deed was secured and

recorded by Thos. A. Palmer an C.W. Strickland so that the parsonage property is now held in Fee Simple. A special meeting of the Quarter-ly conference was convened Feb. 18, 1903, but after much discussion it decided to keep the parsonage of Nassau and repair it. The failure of the petition was due largely to opposition from Whites Chapel. Up to the middle of March the people of Rehoboth continued to hold cottage prayer meetings etc. every night. The meetings were of wonderful power. One man was converted there during the session of the Annual conference in the absence of the pastor. Cottage meetings continued until summer.

1903-04. At the session of Conference Mar. 18, 1903 Bishop Earl Cranston, presiding C.W. Strickland was returned for the second year. At the special meeting of the Quarterly conference held Feb. 18, 1903, a building committed consisting of Alfred King, Wm. D. Wilson, Wolsey C. Hopkins, Theo. W. Palmer, and C.W. Strickland was appointed for the purpose of making needed repairs on parsonage. After consideration they decided to build a new barn and a front porch to parsonage.

Theo. W. Palmer was awarded the contract. The work was completed in July 1903. Before the barn was built the pastor made several efforts to get more land on the back of parsonage lot, so as to set the barn as far back as possible. B. Frank Truitt and his wife after much discussion refused to sell the piece the pastor wished to buy as they could not spare so much.

In 1880, when the parsonage lot was deeded to the Trustees by Judge Wooten, it was found after they began to build the parsonage that they needed more land on the North side of the lot. Mr.

Mires Fisher applied to Judge Wooten for more and the Judge gave to the trustees a triangular piece as laid down in the accompanying plot. Mr. Fisher states that a regular deed was given for the property and that he has seen it. I have made every effort to discover it but have failed C.W.S.

This piece has ever since been fenced in with the original lot and no one has questioned our right to it. The revival meeting during the fall and winter of 1903-04 were rather dull, 12 conversions in all. This was probable a result of having had such a sweeping revival the year before also because of the

farmers were very much delayed with their work there being corn left in the field all winter on almost every farm, also because of the severe weather, which broke up some promising meetins, and finally because of the pastor's health which suffered from a severe fall in which he struck upon the back of his head and was rendered unconscious temporarily.

The year closed harmoniously and collections were slightly advanced. At the conference held at Dover March 16, 1904. Bishop J.M. Fitzgerald presiding, C.W. Strickland who preached the missionary sermon before the conference that year, was returned to Nassau Circuit for the third year.

At the second quarterly conference Sept. 3 at Lewes a committee was appointed to confer with the congregation on the subject of securing a parsonage in Lewes. It reported to the 3rd. quar. Conference which also met at Lewes, after full discussion it was decided to make no change in parsonage location.

The pastor met with the misfortune to cut his foot severely in the fall, which delayed his revival work until winter weather set in. Three meetings were held at Conley's, Whites Chapel and Rehoboth, resulting in 20 conversions.

At the fourth quarterly conference the pastor notified the brethren of his desire for a change. Notwithstanding which he was cordially invited to return. The year closed harmoniously. Benevolent collection being almost up to the two previous years, an the salary being raised in full for the first time in many years, probably in the history of the Charge. Conley's Chapel raised her apportionment without taking any collection in the Church a thing she had done but once before in 1904 in her existance. At the conference which met at Grace Church Wilmington, Bishop Daniel A. Goodsell presiding, Rev. Wm. P. Comptom was sent to Nassau Circuit March 16, 1905.

At the conference of 1908 held in Asbury Church, Wilmington and presided over by Bishop D.A. Goodsell, I was appointed to Nassau. We were cordially received and had one of the best years of my life. Had splendid revival at every Church resulting in over fifty conversions and all the Churches greatly quickened.

At the Conference on the following year (1909) held at Milford and presided over by Bishop David H. Moore, it was thought for the betterment of the work to divide it and accordingly Rehoboth and Conley were set off as a separate work and I was sent there, and Bro. Wm. H. Hudson sent to Nassau Mar. 25, 1909.

The salary was advanced from \$1200 in 1929-30 to \$1400. The salary was further advanced in 1930-1 from \$1400 to \$1500.

251. CONNELY'S METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, 1837. R. F. D., Angela.

Organized 1837, holding services in a small frame building. Incorporated in 1839. This church was built largely through the efforts of the first pastor, who was also a carpenter. It was replaced in 1876 with the present church building. Single story, frame structure. First settled clergyman, Rev. Mr. Connelly, 1837-39.

254. HARTLY METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, 1840--, Main St., Hartly.

Organized 1840 as result of informal services held in the home of Thomas Landman and the Jones' School. In 1840 a one story frame building was erected on the present site and used until 1927 when the present church was dedicated.

Conley Methodist Chapel (M.E.) is located one and one-quarter miles n. e. of Angola. This church was organized in the Angola schoolhouse and was first known as "Angola M. E. Chapel." They were incorporated on Feb. 9, 1838, as "Connelly's M. E. Chapel" while still meeting in the school. In the meantime the name has been shortened to "Conley's." On Feb. 9, 1838, Dagsworthy Derrickson donated to the following trustees, D. W. Brierton, Arthur Milby, Wm. S. Hazzard, David Hazzard and Wm. S. Vessels, 671/sq. perches of land as a church site. It was described as being near the road to Angola Neck.

The first church was built in 1838, through the efforts of the Rev. Mr.

Connelly, a carpenter by trade, for whom it was named.

The present building was erected in 1876. It was thoroughly renovated in 1901. More land was purchased on Sept. 3, 1912, from Dagsworthy D. Burton. In September, 1944, the building was sheathed with white asbestos shingles and the interior was completely renovated. There is a large graveyard enclosed with a low wall. The earliest tombstone is over the grave of Mrs. Hannah Lynch, who died on Apr. 3, 1862.

Trinity P. E. Chapel was located on the Long Neck Road south of the Millsboro-Lewes Road. The first services were started in a nearby schoolhouse in 1845. In 1846, the Chapel of the Comforter was built on this site under the leadership of the Rev. John A. Childs. The half-acre church site was donated by James T. Bayliss, on Feb. 6, 1847, at which time the chapel was under construction.

It was a chapel-of-ease attached to St. George's Church and was consecrated on May 25, 1847, by Bishop Alfred Lee. In 1870, the church was enlarged, a recess chancel and a vestry-room being built. At that time the name "Trinity" was adopted. The building was improved in 1881 and again in 1890

In 1891, a bell was secured and a Bishop's chair and a priest's chair were installed. New windows were installed in 1904. The steeple was wrecked in a wind-storm late in 1916. The last services were held here in 1918. The building gradually disintegrated and by 1940 it was flat upon the ground. The all devouring forest swallowed it up and not an echo lingers to whisper of its former glory. In the meantime the wood-lot, in which it stood, has been out over and no vestige of the chapel remains.

Central M. E. Church is located in Long Neck about two miles n. e. of Harmon's School. It was founded in 1867 and the present building was erected in 1887. This church was never very strong and in 1937 it was closed forever. At the 1941 Methodist Conference it was decided to sell the property.

Friendship M. E. Church, colored, is located about two and one-half miles s. w. of Fairmount. The present church was built in 1895. There is a small graveyard, and across the road from the church is their bush-meeting ground.

Harmony M. E. Church, colored. This church was organized in 1818. A half-acre church site was purchased on Mar. 20, 1819, from Eli Norwood. A church was built and it was located about two and one-half miles west of Friendship Church. They were incorporated on Apr. 21, 1875, while the Rev. T. H. Johnson was pastor. A new church was built in 1891. A half-acre of land for the burial-ground was purchased on June 4, 1915, from Wm. T. Hurdle. They also maintained a bush-meeting ground.

Congratulations on your recent re-election! I often listen to WGMD and have heard you speak many times. You're forthright and honest in carrying out the duties of your office. Thank you.

When you were first elected, I inquired about putting an historical marker at Conley's Church. You offered to set aside funding for this. We are ready to proceed with this. Are you still able to fund this for us?

We would like the sign to read something like this:

Conley's Church was first organized in the Angola Schoolhouse and was called Angola Methodist Episcopal Church. We they incorporated in February 1828, the name was changed to Connelly's Methodist Episcopal Chapel in honor of their first pastor, William Connelly. He was a carpenter who was responsible for the first church building. Eventually the name was shortened to Conley's.

This sanctuary was built in 1876 and thoroughly renovated in 1901. In the summer of 1978, the church constructed the fellowship hall. It began with a generous gift of land from Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mills. Then, church member and master carpenter Charles Baker led several volunteers from the church family on weekday evenings and Saturdays to construct the hall.

The earliest tombstone is over the grave of Mrs. Hannah Lunch who died April 3, 1862.
